


One day not long after that Epimetheus went to gather figs and grapes by himself without asking Pandora. Ever since she had come he had heard about that box, nothing but the box, and he was tired of it. And as soon as he was gone, Pandora kneeled down on the floor and looked intently at it.

It was made of a beautiful kind of wood, and was so highly polished that Pandora could see her face in it. The edges and corners were carved with the most wonderful skill. Around the edge there were figures of graceful men and women and the prettiest children ever seen, reclining or playing in gardens and forests. The most beautiful face of all was done in high relief in the centre of the box. In short, everything that has since afflicted the souls and bodies of mankind had been shut up in the mysterious box given to Epimetheus and Pandora to be kept safely in order that the happy children of the world might never be molested by them. Had they been faithful to their trust all would have gone well with them. No grown person would ever have been sad, nor any child have had cause to shed a single tear, from that hour until this moment.

But it was impossible that the two children should keep the ugly swarm in their own little cottage. Pandora flung open the windows and doors to try and get rid of them and, sure enough, away flew the winged Troubles and so pestered and tormented the people everywhere about that none of them so much as smiled for many days afterward. And the children of the earth, who before had seemed ageless, now grew older, day by day, and came soon to be youths and maidens, and men and women, and then old folks, before they dreamed of such a thing.


"Your wings are colored like the rainbow," exclaimed Pandora, "How beautiful!"

1. What is **MYTHOLOGY**? First, let's start this study off with the definition of *myth* by **Britannica**:

*“Myth, a symbolic narrative, usually of unknown origin and at least partly traditional, that ostensibly relates actual events and that is especially associated with religious belief. It is distinguished from symbolic behavior (cult, ritual) and symbolic places or objects (temples, icons). **Myths** are specific accounts of gods or superhuman beings involved in extraordinary events or circumstances in a time that is unspecified but which is understood as existing apart from ordinary human experience. The term mythology denotes both the study of myth and the body of myths belonging to a particular religious tradition.”*

Wow, sounds like the contents of someone's Facebook feed! We could think of social media as a modern day Pandora's box. What's a Christian to do? Do we justify our social media presence and time investment like Pandora did in deciding to open it?

"Jackie Hill Perry writes, 'It is not wise or healthy to disassociate what you say on social media from who you are. It seems as if many, including Christians, feel the freedom to be critical, divisive, harsh, and flat out wicked with speech via social media as if it is not AS damaging. Don't be fooled, you will be judged just as much for what you said with your mouth as you will with what you've typed with your hands.'" - Randy Alcorn

*"I have seen [The Social Dilemma](#) on Netflix (and if you haven't, you should) but the big idea it presented is that social media is designed from the ground up to **addict** you, in a way that no other tool of human invention ever has. Where I think the film fell short is that the problem was presented as a sort of Greek fatalistic tale of **Pandora's box** that can't be*

retracted or controlled. As Christians, we can't accept fatalism because we believe the earth is the Lord's, and the fullness therein (**Psalm 24:1**), and that what man intends for evil, God means for good (**Genesis 50:20**). I think social media can be redeemed as a tool for the gospel, through hospitality, as long as it's done carefully and intentionally...Are we viewing our social media accounts as a place to serve the needs of others, remaining conscious that we are ambassadors for the gospel? The reputation we build for ourselves online is the reputation that carries over into our in-person relationships, and by extension, is the reputation we build for the Church. We need to be strategic and intentional to live our online lives in a manner worthy of the calling to which we have been called (**Ephesians 4:1**)."

Galatians 5:22-23 NLT But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against these things!

Romans 5:5 ERV And this hope will never disappoint us. We know this because God has poured out his love to fill our hearts through the Holy Spirit he gave us.

Jeremiah 29:11 ERV I know the plans that I have for you, declares the LORD. They are plans for peace and not disaster, plans to give you a future filled with hope.

Romans 15:13 AMPC May the God of your hope so fill you with all joy and peace in believing [through the experience of your faith] that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound *and* be overflowing (bubbling over) with hope.

"Sometimes we hope for things in which there is no hope. A car can't bring true hope; it can bring a feeling of contentment and exhilaration, but not real hope. Financial stability can't bring true hope; it can bring security and a level of ease, but not true hope. A spouse can't bring true hope because a spouse's abilities are limited to what he or she can control. True hope comes from the One who created hope: God. True hope comes by trusting God even when circumstances are difficult. One way to know whether you're trusting God is whether you're obeying his Word. Trust produces obedience, which produces hope, which results in joy and peace; and that is the power of the Holy Spirit."

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
